



The quarter had a turbulent start, with a substantial sell-off in January and February followed by a large rally in March. Of note and concern was increasing evidence that negative interest rate policies pursued by the ECB and the Bank of Japan appear to be failing, with the respective currencies strengthening (in Japan's case very substantially) and stock markets falling.

After December's US rate hike, the first in almost 10 years, market expectations of further 2016 US rate hikes faded in response to slightly weaker economic data. The US dollar weakened as a result.

In a complete turnaround from the previous quarter, emerging markets were the stand out performers with the MSCI Emerging markets delivering a return of 5.8% for the quarter versus -0.2% for the World Index. US dollar returns in Brazil and Turkey were particularly strong, followed by Russia and South Africa, whilst those across developed market indices were generally negative.

On the domestic front, ratings agencies S&P and Moody's have placed SA sovereign ratings on review. This is due to continuing risks to South Africa's medium-term growth prospects and the lack of progress on growth-enabling reforms. A foreign currency rating downgrade to below investment grade rating is likely sometime this year (and appears to be largely priced in). While less likely, a downgrade of the local currency rating to sub-investment grade would be far more serious and is likely to lead to South Africa's exclusion from key global government bond indices with the risk of substantial capital repatriation on the part of foreign bond investors and associated currency weakness. The South African Reserve Bank maintained its cautiously hawkish monetary stance and hiked rates by 25bps in March.

The ALSI gained 3.9% in the first quarter driven primarily by Resources which were up 13.2%. Industrial metals stocks (+93.1%), gold stocks (+92.8%) and platinum stocks (+74.6%) stood out as particularly strong. Financials likewise experienced a good quarter, posting a positive return of 6.2%; however Industrials performed poorly posting a negative 0.4% return.

The fund slightly underperformed its benchmark over the quarter, driven by costs incurred from flows and significant index changes that necessitated trading. The fund continues to closely track its benchmark, the FTSE/JSE Top 40 Index, which closed the quarter up 1.5%.
